North Park – Maintenance Assessment District Community Advisory Committee Minutes [DRAFT] December 10, 2012

Rob Steppke, Vice-Chair, called the regular meeting of the North Park (NP) Maintenance Assessment District (MAD) Community Advisory Committee to order at 6:03 p.m. at the North Park Adult Activity Center, 2719 Howard Avenue, in San Diego, CA.

1. Roll Call

2. Approval of minutes – November 13th meeting

Rob noted that his office is "Vice Chair" rather than "Co-Chair". Approved with that correction: Kevin/Steve, 4-0-4 (Morrison, Weber, Gross, Sherwood) (prior to Callen's arrival).

3. Chair's Report

Rob noted that, regarding the budget discussion, we can take action tonight, but we don't have to.

4. Non-agenda Public Comment

5. Councilmember's report – Anthony Bernal

6. Report: Operational/Streetscape Maintenance – City Staff Info/Discussion

Staff reported on operational and maintenance issues. Copies of the Staff Report for December were distributed earlier by email and are attached to these minutes. In addition to the information on that report, there were the following discussions:

- A Bradford Pear tree at the (former) Post Office was also replaced.
- Irrigation inspections are being made on El Cajon Blvd.

- There were 3 non-working acorn lights on University Ave., and 2 on El Cajon Blvd.
- Rob noted that the matter of the landscaping at the proposed AT&T cell tower at Boundary & Meade has not yet been agendized at the Urban Design/Project Review Subcommittee.
- Steve noted that the decorative trash can at the NW corner of 29th & NP Way has no lock.

7. FY 2014 Budget - Andy Field/City Staff - Information/Discussion/Action

- Andy recapped the budget discussion to date.
- Note: Services formerly provided by Urban Corps have been folded into Shoreline's contract.
- Reminder: the \$19,139.40 shown for Tree Trimming Services (Group 1, etc) in FY 2012, should have been for Tree Trimming Services Palm Trimming.
- Discussion about responsibility for steel replacement liners for trash cans: the city maintains the non-decorative ones that were in place per their schedule (as of 5 years ago). They use inexpensive metal cans except for those needing taller, slimmer liners.
- Shoreline is covering more services than Aztec/Urban Corps did. Their contract is for 5 years, to be reviewed annually.
- The CPI of 3% is the SDCPI determined by the Assessment Engineering team, based on last February's Bureau of Labor local figures, and adjusted in March.
- Steve noted that the MAD gets lots of input requesting trash cans and he is strongly in support of
 continuing to provide them. He would rather cut out the \$10K that is budgeted for optional palm
 tree trimming. Kitty noted the safety hazard presented by untrimmed palm trees. Gary noted that
 if we continue to pay for palm tree trimming, the City will walk away from it. Rob agreed.
- Rob noted that now is the time to make adjustments. The assessment is going up only 66 cents. 66 cents X 18000 ~ \$12,000. We have lots in reserves can we keep the assessment the same? Steve noted that the reserve only covers 6 months.
- Beth noted that NPCA would rather see money spent on palm tree trimming than on decorative trash cans. Kevin said that the trash cans are necessary. Beth asked the difference in cost between plain cans and decorative ones. It's about \$300 [\$800 plain, \$1100 decorative]. Cory said that the decorative ones are easier to clean and less graffiti-friendly.
- Karen asked if the City has put more money into palm tree trimming. It put about \$300-400K back in the budget for palm tree trimming, but only for emergency services. This was after a man got crushed under a palm bulb that fell on him. Cory said they don't fall often, except in storms.
- Gary said that NPCA should advocate to the City to trim the palm trees.
- Andy noted that MADs are to provide special benefits, and that the MAD should contact the City
 to maintain the appropriate level of palm tree trimming services despite the existence of MADs.
 He said that the program has morphed from "for safety" to "trim all", and that it is too timeintensive to determine which palms need trimming for safety reasons. The MAD does notify the
 City when it notes a specific safety issue.
- Cory noted that the MAD can't do the palm tree trimming in each sector for \$10K a year the sectors will end up changing in size to accommodate the budgeted amount.
- Mike suggested that we ask the City why the MAD should keep putting money into palm tree trimming if the City isn't doing it.
- Beth will talk to the NPCA about contacting the City and requesting they do more palm tree trimming.
- Rob asked what we wanted to do. Steve says remove palm tree trimming. Lucky asked what do the founding documents say? Gary noted that on the easterly portion of El Cajon Blvd, appearance and safety are important and they've done it because they had the money, but that we need to get the City to do its job.
- Lucky asked if we assume liability by doing the palm tree trimming. Andy said the City is liable
 despite who cares for it. Property owners have some responsibility, 50-50, but the City has
 deeper pockets.

- Rob asked who would support reducing the \$10K for palm tree trimming to \$3K. Karen: 10, Steve: 0 or 10, Gary: 10, Ginny: 10, Kevin: 10, Beth: 10, Lucky: cut them down? Andy says that removing trees requires permits, has its own liability. It was decided to leave the \$10K in the budget for palm tree trimming.
- Rob noted that \$30K that was for re-balloting "Clean & Safe" was folded back into reserves.
 Should we be putting money aside for re-balloting in the future? Andy noted that the Golden Hill MAD decision may make it more expensive to re-ballot due to the costs of the special vs. general benefits analysis it could cost \$45-50K.
- Andy: The standards of the City determine the "general benefit". The incremental differences between what the City does and what the people want determine the "special benefits". There are also the "pass through" benefits as determined by traffic studies.
- Rob confirmed that we can adjust certain specific budget items as they arise in the next year.
- Motion to support the proposed budget for FY 2014: Steve/Karen, 9-0-0.
- We will need to determine locations for additional trash cans.
- Cory will talk to us when he is ready to trim trees in next sector we can accept it or agendize a budget transfer.
- Rob said that palm tree trimming won't go on forever. Cory noted that there is \$10K for trees planted/maintained by the MAD and the 600 young maturing trees will need more care.

Trees:

- Removals: a Chinese Flame tree removed and replaced with Pink Trumpet tree, 3925 Ohio St. near Queen Bee's Art and Cultural Ctr.
- > Trimming: Gold Medallion trees were pruned on Meade Ave.
- ➤ Vandalism: None to report this month.

North Park Main Street (University Ave, North Park Way, and 30th St):

- > Vendors cleaned up area before and after the Toyland Parade, with no difficulties or problems.
- > Graffiti removal, cleaning, etc. continues as normal

El Cajon Boulevard:

- ➤ Medians Lantana is being treated for mealy bugs.
- > Graffiti removal, cleaning, etc. continues as normal

Street Lights:

➤ Staff inspected acorn street lights throughout MAD on the evening of December 5, 2012. A list of non-working lights was turned into Street Division for repair.

North Park Gateway/Boundary Street and Ann Mudge Project:

> General maintenance continues as normal.

Budget and Contract Updates:

➤ Budget Process – The budget was presented by City staff at the November meeting, and the budget discussion continue at the meeting on December 10, 2012.

Capital Projects:

- ➤ North Park Street Lighting (Final Phase) This project is with Engineering & Capital Projects. The construction schedule for the final 11 street lights is still pending. (No change from last month.)
- Switzer Canyon/30th Street Bridge Enhancement The advocate group and Kotaro Nakamura (from Roesling Nakamura Terada Architects) met with the City Engineer on July 20 to discuss the proposed improvement project to the 30th Street Bridge over Switzer Canyon. Andy Field submitted the project through the City's project intake process to the City Engineer on August 28 to initiate preliminary design and determine the cost of the proposed project. (*No change from last month.*)
- ➤ Red Sidewalk Replacement on University Avenue This project has been submitted to Engineering & Capital Projects. It is likely that work will be coordinated with UAMP. The project manager will likely attend an upcoming advisory committee meeting to discuss project scope and schedule.
